"You have been heroes," Calhoun Principal Nicole Hollings said. "You are a hero because you stopped your day to be a friend who needed help or for someone who is just different than you, because you stood up to be a champion for the rights of others, because you defend the rights of all. You chose kindness even when someone has been cruel to you."

Students, faculty and Board members addressed crowds that convened for the three high school celebrations.

Kennedy salutatorian Dylan Judd told his fellow classmates that education is something you can't put a price tag on and encouraged them to spark their quest for education with a passion.

"Schools provide the materials to light this flame," he said. "We can engineer the spark with the various tools at our disposal, allowing us to illuminate who and what we are meant to be."

Mepham salutatorian Isabelle Chan noted that her friendships, some since elementary school, enriched her Mepham experience and the school as a whole.

"Mepham High School has forever been made better because you were here," she stated. "Each and every one of us has made a mark on the hallowed halls and in the hearts of one another that will forever resonate and be remembered for years after we close our lockers for the last time."


Calhoun valedictorian Joy Ma told fellow classmates to remember their roots as they set off on new adventures, and to also find the "joy" in their lives.
