

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ROLE OF SCHOOL COUNSELOR

The following functions of the school counselor are developmental and impact on all grade levels:

- Academic Improvement and Planning: includes the selection of a plan of study, placement into appropriate courses and programs, attendance improvement, and developing study skills as well as peace-making strategies, and promoting prejudice reduction and compassion.
- Personal/Social Growth: includes counseling focused on building self-esteem, communication skills, decision-making and relationship skills, as well as promoting peace-making strategies, prejudice-reduction and compassion.
- > Crisis Intervention: includes counseling students in crisis and providing referrals necessary.
- Transitional Services: orients students as they move from grade to grade, as well as from school building to school building, to provide a comfortable and success-oriented learning environment.
- > **Parent Support:** assists parents in understanding the full complement of educational services, which may be available to help their students reach their goals and maximize their potential.
- Career/Life Planning: increases students' awareness of the career and educational planning process and of individual careers themselves while instilling in students the values and attitudes necessary for becoming successful contributors to their families and to society.
- Consultation: includes serving as a reference and resource regarding student and school issues for the school's Pupil Personnel Services Team (psychologists, social workers, teachers, nurses, administrators) and the community, as well as for local state agencies, mental health offices/clinics, and other professionals designated by parents/guardians and/or the school district.

EXTRA-HELP SCHEDULE: After school help is available on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. Students are urged to take advantage of these sessions as needed. After school activities (clubs, sports, etc.) begin **after** extra-help sessions. In addition, peer tutors are available through the National Honor Society. HONOR SOCIETY PEER TUTORS: Information on Honor Society Peer Tutors may be obtained from Mr. Dan Vessely and Mr. Steven Mastromarino. They can be reached at 992-1400.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY: Students are eligible for election to the National Honor Society in the spring of their junior year. Qualifications are scholarship (overall unweighted average of 87.5% or higher), character, leadership, and service to the school. Students have a second opportunity to qualify in the fall of their senior year. An unweighted average of 87.5% is needed at that time, as well. Students must show considerable involvement in school organizations to be elected to National Honor Society.

¹ Students identified as having a handicapping condition may be exempt from these requirements if a student's IEP states that such requirements are not appropriate. Students completing a five-unit sequence in the Arts (visual arts, music, dance, theater) or Career and Technological Education may also be exempt.

² Pathways to Graduation – "4 + 1" Regents Diploma Option: Effective January 2015, students will be allowed to substitute one of the two Social Studies Regents exams with a number of different Career and Technical Education (CTE) assessments or an additional Regents exam in either math or science, or the World Language checkpoint B exam.

Students may satisfy testing requirements with SAT and SAT Subject Tests or Advanced Placement exams. Please see your child's school counselor for additional information.

The best way to ensure that your son or daughter meets all graduation requirements is to speak with your child's school counselor. The school counselor is the best source for reviewing changing graduation requirements and discussing the various options for meeting those requirements.

GUIDELINES FOR PARTICIPATION IN EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The Bellmore-Merrick Central High School District provides the opportunity for students to participate in a wide range of extra-curricular activities. Staff members encourage students to cultivate their interests, demonstrate their skills, acquire new skills, and develop leadership potential. Since participation in these voluntary activities is both desirable and meritorious, students, as representatives of the school, must maintain an acceptable level of academic performance and display appropriate behavior and good citizenship in and out of the classroom. Students must be in school by Period 4 in order to participate in any extra-curricular activity. In addition, any student suspended, in school or out of school, is not allowed to participate in the after-school program for the duration of the suspension. Any alcohol/drug related suspension will lead to dismissal from a sports team and/or the equivalent suspension from an extra-curricular activity.

January/February

- Course selection for tenth grade is reviewed in small groups and individually with the student's school counselor.
- > Parents receive course selection sheets for their signature and return to the school counselor.
- School counselors continue to meet with students individually to review goals.
- Second quarter report cards are available on line through the Parent Portal.

<u>March</u>

- Tenth grade course selection verification sheets are mailed home; parents review and contact the school counselor if changes are necessary.
- > Third quarter progress reports are available on line through the Parent Portal.

<u>April</u>

- The Living Environment-A students should discuss the possibility of taking the SAT Subject Test in Biology with their Science teachers and counselor.
- SAT Subject Test registration forms are available in the guidance office, or students may visit <u>www.collegeboard.com</u> to register for the SAT Subject Tests.
- Informal follow-up meetings are held to make any necessary adjustments to 10th grade course selection.
- > School counselors continue to meet with students individually to review goals.
- > Third quarter report cards are available on line through the Parent Portal.

June

- > Second set of 10^{th} grade course selection verification sheets are mailed home; parents review and contact the school if changes are necessary.

- School counselors contact families as needed regarding course failures and summer school registration.
