The meeting was called to order at 8:03 p.m. Dr. Kaplan, Board of Education CALL TO ORDER President, welcomed everyone and led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mrs. Goller moved that the Board of Education approve the Treasurer's Report, **TREASURER'S REPORT** for the month ended February 28, 2018. Mrs. Blane seconded and the motion was carried 8-0.

Mr. DeTommaso welcomed everyone. Earlier tonight we recognized a very successful team and a student's accomplishment. Calhoun's Cheerleading team is the Nassau County Champion and Kennedy student Jessica Rosen is the recipient of a very prestigious award, the National Gold Medal from Scholastic Art and Writing. We always have many awards and if we recognized them all, we'd be here all night. We will now recognize Jason Boland for receiving the Distinguished Teacher of the Year Award from the Harvard Club.

DISTINGUISHED TEACHER OF THE YEAR	Ms. Gargiulo presented an Award of Honor certificate to English teacher Jason Boland recognizing him as a Distinguished Teacher of the Year by the Harvard Club of Long Island. Mr. Boland was nominated by Calhoun graduate and present Harvard student, Julia Losner for this award. Mr. Boland is a product of the Bellmore-Merrick Central High School District. A graduate of Calhoun High School, he began his educational career at Merrick Avenue Middle School, and then after three years, he continued on to Calhoun High School teaching students of all grades including 11 AP English Language. A former Herald reporter and editor, Mr. Boland has functioned as the <i>Hoofbeats</i> advisor for the last twelve years. He has been invited to speak at the Columbia Scholastic Press Association's annual convention, presenting to over 200 other advisers and journalism students about "Reinventing your school newspaper." An all-year contributor to the Bellmore- Merrick school community, Mr. Boland has also functioned as Girls Varsity Softball coach for the past fifteen years and a summer school teacher for the past twenty years. On behalf of the Board of Education, Ms. Gargiulo congratulated and thanked Mr. Boland for his tremendous impact on Bellmore-Merrick.
	Mr. DeTommaso congratulated everyone. He stated college and university acceptance letter are out. He is proud that our students have the opportunity to go to the schools they choose due to the wonderful foundation they receive at Bellmore-Merrick. Our students are prepared to go off into the world. He gave a brief summary of the security measures the district has taken since last month. All students have been issued IDs, monitoring of public websites, additional security guards for round-the-clock coverage, assigned NCPD Resource Coordinator Officer Monez, Security Audit to be performed on 4/19-26/18, Mepham's transition to one main entrance through the lobby and vestibule building to begin in the near future.
STUDENT REPRESENTATIVES	Mr. DeTommaso announced that student representatives Gina Connors and Jordan Ladd were not able to attend tonight's meeting. He had the principals give a brief overview of the past month at Meadowbrook Alternative Learning Program (MAP) and Mepham HS.
	Mrs. Ellinghaus stated seniors have been receiving college acceptance letters to schools such as the University of New Haven and Farmingdale. Students observed <i>"Twelve Angry Men"</i> and MAP students wear their IDs on red lanyards.
	Mr. DeTommaso stated Bellmore-Merrick has one of the finest Alternative Learning programs in New York State. This is year twelve and the quality of education is second to none.
	Mr. Gomez stated it has been a busy month at Mepham. Earlier this month, Mepham students held a Cultural Night and an Open Mic Night. All three nights' performances of " <i>In the Heights</i> " were amazing.
	Daniel O'Keefe also congratulated Mr. Boland and the Cheerleading team. He stated Calhoun students participated in the Walk-Out and hosted a Debate Night. Seniors won "Class Night". "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dream Coat"

was a success. Honor Society inductions were held. There were 20 medalists at the DECA trip and Model UN also had a trip. He advised he will be attending Binghamton University in the Fall.

Rachel Katz stated seniors won Kennedy's Class Night. Students have sponsored many community service events such as the Prom Dress Drive. The production of *"Fiddler on the Roof"* was fantastic. Honor society inductions were held. She congratulated Jessica Rosen, the Cultural Arts Award recipients and Dr. Bollettieri. STEM Career Fair was informative. All JFK fall and winter sports teams qualified for play-offs. Kennedy students held a Walk Out which was very respectful. She has committed to Cornell University in the Fall.

Mr. DeTommaso mentioned that Dr. Bollettieri will be recognized as a 2018 Nassau BOCES Education Partner at a dinner ceremony this Wednesday evening. Mr. DeTommaso added the annual 5K Run/Walk was held in March.

Dr. Bollettieri stated there were 381 runners this year and \$7,585 was raised to benefit the Community Cupboard. She thanked everyone who participated in any way and added a special thanks to Robyn Einbinder and Joe Netto.

Mr. DeTommaso stated the Community Cupboard helps 40 families on a bi-weekly basis.

Dr. Bollettieri introduced two new chairpersons, Ann Donaldson, Social Studies, and David Prince, Math.

BUDGET PRESENTATION

Mr. DeTommaso stated the 2018-2019 School Budget is very responsible to the community. The tax levy is 2.65%. The budget includes additional teachers and funding from the sale of the Jerusalem Avenue school. Included in this budget is the establishment of Health and Wellness Centers at each of the schools from 3:00 to 6:00 PM weekdays. He feels this will be an enormous help for kids and families. The district will not go over the cap.

Assistant Superintendent for Business Kate Freeman gave a Powerpoint presentation on the 2018-2019 School Budget. She stated this budget continues programs, expands and adds new initiatives, adds 12 positions (four guidance counselors and one social worker), increases the number of security guards and establishes Health and Wellness Centers. The \$159,788,043 budget is an increase of 6.1 million dollars (3.9%) with a proposed tax levy of 2.65%. She displayed the past ten years' budget numbers, state aid amounts, schedule of reserves and tax cap formula. Benefits and debt service have increased. This year's CPI is 2%. Proceeds from the sale of Jerusalem Avenue will be put into a Reserve Account for tax reduction.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT Mr. DeTommaso mentioned the upcoming dates listed on the agenda. He stated not all work in the schools is Bond work. The budgets have included building and grounds maintenance work. This work is performed by our custodians.
